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Social-Emotional Learning at FCS

Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) is an essential component of keeping children and youth safe and healthy. Social-Emotional Learning programs delivered in schools help students succeed in school and in life. Schools are focusing more on developing SEL programming for students as research highlights the positive relationship of SEL to academic success. Social -Emotional Learning is described as the process of developing core competencies in

the following areas: self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making skills. Students who develop skills in Social-Emotional Learning demonstrate personal characteristics such as a strong work ethic, the ability to work effectively with others, flexibility, empathy, and confidence. Research shows that schools that utilize SEL programs effectively have fewer discipline problems, lower levels of emotional distress among students, fewer reports of bullying, and improved academic performance on standardized tests. Providing Social-Emotional Learning opportunities in the early grades, and throughout the school years, enhances students' social and emotional behaviors that will impact their success in school and beyond.

The Falconer Central School District introduced Second Step: Skills for Social & Academic Success in the Fall of 2016. Second Step is an evidence -based Social-Emotional Learning program that is grounded in extensive research and is currently used by thousands of schools across the United States. The early learning component of the program is introduced by the teachers in our UPK classes. The school social workers and counselors present Second Step SEL lessons to all students in grades 1 through 8. The lessons include engaging videos followed by discussion, activities, and games focused on SEL skills, such as, focusing attention, managing disappointment, accepting differences, empathy, disagreeing respectfully, and coping with stress. Now in its 2nd year of implementation, FCS classroom teachers, support staff, and administrators are utilizing consistent terminology and effective SEL strategies from the Second Step program. As a result, students will be able to build upon core Social-Emotional Learning principles from year to year that will support the development of critical competencies.


Today's students are coming to school more stressed than ever. Increased academic standards, challenging social and economic factors that families face each day, and the impact of technology and social media which extend beyond the school day all contribute to those stress levels. Our commitment to Social-Emotional Learning will assist our students in developing the skills necessary to manage daily challenges and improve academic outcomes.







Kagan Cooperative learning structures are being implemented in all 6th grade classes. The students have experienced FIND SOMEONE WHO, QUIZ QUIZ TRADE, and RALLY COACH. Students are getting used to sitting in groups of two or four and interacting with an "elbow partner" or a "face partner". Cooperative learning ensures positive interdependence, individual accountability, equal participation, and simultaneous interaction. This approach minimizes the "hogs and logs" meaning kids who take over a group or kids who hide and never want to answer. Students will be better prepared to work together towards the common goal, LEARNING THE DAILY OBJECTIVE!

Reality Check Makes A Mark

The week of November 14, Falconer's Reality Check "cupped the fence" in honor of the Great American Smokeout with the phrase "Avg age of smokers is 13!" to bring attention to this 2016-2017 finding about how young children are when they first get their hands on tobacco products and how that can grow into more dangerous activity. This worked its way into a training that a handful of the members got to attend on November 17 at Chautauqua Central School. The training was a youth-focused event geared to engage students in drug awareness, youth-focused and youth-led prevention, and taught strategies to reduce the risks related to youth drug use. The training program brought together grade 7 - 12 students interested in working with other students to reduce the harm caused by substance abuse. Students learned about the problem, learned skills needed to take action, and were exposed to many ideas for projects and activities. The event gave the participants advanced training, information and skills that they could use as youth leaders while having a ton of fun. It was led by HOPE Chautauqua's Youth Advisory Committee and inspired our group to begin planning our own Awareness Theatre skit to perform in April on dangerous substances that are at the hands of today's youth and how to prevent it.
